

Those who grew up attending Sunday School likely remember the hand-play where we locked our fingers together, facing down, put our index fingers together, pointing up, and brought our thumbs together. Together we recited, "Here's the church, here's the steeple, open the door, and see all the people." Then we wiggled

our fingers and giggled. We learned, from an early age, that church is the people.

This pandemic is reminding us in a powerful way that "*Church is who we are not where we go.*" Our typically bustling building is very quiet these days, almost eerie. The one exception is when we host the **Red Cross Blood Drives** — two are scheduled for Saturdays, May 2nd and 16th. Maybe you want to sign up to donate? They cannot accommodate walk-ins.

Church of the Nativity, however, is anything but quiet. You'll see in this newsletter that lots of ministry is happening outside of our building — virtual Sunday School, Youth Meetings, Council Meetings, even Choir Rehearsals. People are connecting on-line for worship. Can you believe that we had 124 people connect on Holy Thursday, 173 for Good Friday, and 288 on Easter Sunday? And this doesn't account for multiple people watching! I'm certain that in my 38 years of ministry, I've never had 173+ people attend a Good Friday service! We also have people from various parts of the country tuning in — some are former members, others are connecting because someone from Nativity shared the link! Our mission to be a "*Welcoming, Nurturing, Empowering* community of faith carrying Christ's love, justice, and peace into our community and world" is very much alive.

Furthermore, what I've listed is just some of the ministry Church of the Nativity is accomplishing every day. Some of our young people are serving as grocery clerks/stockers and fast-food servers. Members and friends are working in hospitals and doctor's offices. We have paid and volunteer first responders, bankers and IT specialists. Still others are teachers connecting in new ways with their students. Parents are learning to home school (except for new math—nobody understands that!). People are delivering meals to those who can't risk going to the grocery store and several folks are making masks to be given away. All are praying! The list could go on and on but you get the point: "Church is who we are not where we go!"

Dear Nativity Friends,

As I look back at last month's *Nativity News*, I marvel at all the plans that were scheduled for the Easter season and beyond. It's now hard to believe that most of those plans were not allowed to happen.

As we were all told to stay home and to practice social distancing, a new normal had begun. We now had only our homes and our families to shelter in place with. There was only one lifeline; the internet. How was this going to allow us to see and worship with our Nativity family on Sundays? What about fellowship? What about the music? (The dictionary defines 'Harmony' as two or more notes sounding together.) How was this going to happen when gathering was becoming more and more limited every day? After some brainstorming it was decided that we would move forward by pre-recording a mini-Sunday service each week. This would then be available for folks to watch on-line when they could.

Because music is such an important part of the service, an all-call went out to the Chancel Choir and Praise Team for volunteers to be soloists for these services. We had many answer the call. So far we have had Sharon Schlegel, Steve Copps, Chrissy DeMart, Praise Team Director Sean Irawan, Mark Kloss and Aaron Mason share their musical talents with us for our on-line services.

Also part of the new normal has been the increased usage of apps like 'FaceTime,' and the new way to gather together, the 'Zoom Meeting.' Pastor Ruth got us set up early on so that we could take advantage of these opportunities. The Chancel Choir continues to Zoom meet every other Thursday evening. These meetings allow us the chance to check-in with each other. So much is changing every day. We have shared updated church news and events, personal situations and needs and a fair share of good news and laughter. *(See photo on page 10.)*

The Youth Choir has also had several Zoom meetings. This, too, was a great way to check-in with the kids about doing school work at home, coping with siblings, and of course, boredom. We experimented with having a virtual rehearsal together. Since the kids already had copies of the cantata at home it made sense to give it a try. We tried some echo-

singing warm-ups. I sang a short phrase and they all sang back what they heard. There is a slight delay when something is said and when it's actually heard. This was a bit challenging but we managed. So off we went practicing "The Big Fish -Jonah's Whale of a Tale." The plan is to keep working on the piece in the hopes that we may



get to perform it for the congregation in the near future.

This is the part of the newsletter where I usually list the rehearsal times for all the choirs. Obviously at this time we are not in the regular rehearsal mode. I would encourage you all to Google the very inspirational song, "You'll Never Walk Alone." I hope this will help get you through these trying days.

Our Senior High Youth Group continues to meet every week via Zoom for about an hour to check in and chat. This past week, some of our recent graduates joined in. It was great to see them and hear about how they have been transitioning to doing college classes at home and what is happening with their families and jobs.

You may not all know this, but many of our high schoolers and young adults are essential workers who are keeping our community afloat on the "front lines" right now. They work in grocery stores, pizza places, pharmacies, etc. I'm sure you've seen some loving gestures offered during these past weeks to people in these roles, as they have, but it sounds like they have also seen more than their fair share of unloving behavior. If any of us ever has a moment where we feel like being unkind to our essential workers, let's try to remember the faces of our own Nativity youth/young adults and spread the love of Christ instead. If we can afford a little extra tip, we might want to give it, especially with "no contact" deliveries. Since our smiles can't be seen behind masks, we can thank the cashier for being there with

words or extra diligence to keep them safe. I bet it would mean a lot more to those who are working



tired and often frustrated than it costs us to do.

As for me, personally, I have been learning a lot about myself during this pandemic. I remembered how much I love teaching Sunday School and have enjoyed thinking of fun ways to share the stories for

the week to all the different age groups on Class Dojo. I am grateful to have the chance to do a Children's Time each week during our mini worship service even though being on camera so often is still a stretch for me.



I have also had to re-evaluate what "helping" our families looks like right now. I have slowly learned that not every family wants or needs more connection right now. Some parents are overwhelmed working from home and helping their own kids with school and some kids are overwhelmed from too much virtual school. Others are missing Sunday School and church and are enjoying and thriving in our online environment. In all honesty, especially at the beginning of this, I struggled with not feeling disappointed or like I was failing because I did not have 100% or sometimes even 50% participation. But what I started to hear (really hear) from our parents was that some families just need a little space right now. They feel supported and their kids feel loved by their families and by us whether they are commenting and posting or not. I think this dose of reality (and humility) will continue to make me better at my ministry to our families when we are worshipping in the building again. I am realizing that the same ebb and flow of participation will always be with us.

One big lesson I am learning and hope to remind myself and others is that lack of attendance/ participation more often than not has nothing to do with interest or desire. More often it is due to the hectic pace of life and the requirements placed on our families from all sides, including having to work on Sundays. At the same time, this pandemic might also change what we see as essential in the future, too, and help us be more creative in reaching those who can't get to worship on a Sunday morning.

No matter what happens around us, the Spirit is at work within us. May we be open to receiving whatever its message is for us today and every day. I love and miss you all, and I especially look forward to hearing the sounds of our kids laughing in the halls of the church again!


Easter crosses created by two Middle High Youth Group members. Two of the blessed recipients appear at far right.





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The Clean Air Coalition (CAC) Zooms Towards Answers



A few weeks ago someone asked about the emerging change in my schedule as COVID-19 befell us. The questioner implied I wouldn't be as busy because of the new restrictions on our movements. I allowed for a dramatic pause and said I was just as swamped with

Clean Air. In retrospect, that was an understatement. CAC is more active than ever.

Granted, we had to cancel our many in-person meetings but we've actually increased our exchanges. Our plans for a Membership/Open House event and our Annual Dinner are likewise now non-events. But we are now more involved via conference calls and Zoom. These online gatherings are held more than ever and they also allow us to keep in touch, a very important social activity. Before each virtual meeting, we do our **PIES** check-in. PIES refers to us relating how we are, "Physically, Intellectually, Emotionally and Spiritually." This is a valuable tool for all of us. It's a great way to keep tabs on each other.

We at Clean Air continue our many campaigns and then some. Regarding Tonawanda Coke, we continue to press NYS's DEC to do its due diligence to clean up the site, which now is almost equally divided into State Superfund and State Brownfields Programs. The information that the DEC makes available on the details and steps for these tools for remediating the area is very confusing and appears to be an attempt to obfuscate what the public should expect. I'm in the process of trying to bring some clarity to this information and make it available for public consumption. We will be utilizing the expertise of others in this unjumbling.

We continue our work concerning *Tonawanda To-morrow*, our Membership/Open House drive (which we might try virtually), the American Axle site, and following up on the Buscaglia Demolition case.

Clean Air has taken on more work. As some of you may have heard, President Trump plans to relax EPA's enforcement of its rules and regulations. We consider this a hostile power grab at the behest of the oil and chemical industries, and major corporations, which further threatens our health and safety, already at risk with the coronavirus. During an intra -state and multi-state Zoom meeting, we're enlisting the help of concerned citizens and organizations and across-the-board politicians and governmental agencies to have NYS's Attorney General, Letitia James, sue the Trump Administration to force the EPA to do what its name implies.



Reflecting on Covid 19 in Indonesia

The following was sent by mission co-worker in Indonesia, Karen Campbell-Nelson, in response to an email sent to all mission co-workers from Global Ministries Co-Executives, Rev. Dr. Julia Brown Karimu and Rev. Dr. Karen Georgia Thompson.

...When medical and laboratory resources are so limited in Indonesia, the government is faced with making hard decisions about distribution priorities. As a result, some provinces are better equipped to

respond than others. Our province, in a predominantly rural-based economy of eastern Indonesia, must compete with urban areas where cases can be clearly counted and the urgency is felt more immediately. As with other provinces in eastern Indonesia, we face grave shortages of masks, ventilators, isolation spaces, plus the challenge of getting valid

samples to the very few labs in the country (hours away by plane in Jakarta) where they are held in an increasingly extended waiting line. The growing number of people who ARE being tracked here challenges the untenable notion held by too many people we know, namely that our province is virus free. The number of OPD (people under observation) and PDP (patients under supervision) in our province continues to grow. These expert-sounding acronyms are, I think, being used in part to mask the reality of the province's inability to conduct adequate and reliable testing. Although the problem of shortages is nothing compared to what is being faced in hot spots in the US, should serious virusrelated illnesses and deaths begin to be felt here, the shortages will be no less debilitating for doctors and nurses who must treat the ill. It has been reported that a few Indonesian doctors serving patients in Java have already died.

John and I remain healthy and seek to continue our ministry as best we can, working remotely from home as do our colleagues here. At the same time, we also have trouble knowing what is best to do sometimes. For example, we have opened our home to a few neighborhood children (grade school and jr. high levels) for a couple of small classes that includes 10-year-old Santi whose family lives with us. Crowding around a laptop screen for online lessons doesn't support social distancing, but we do insist on frequent handwashing and use the opportunity to teach the children about viruses and how they spread.



The GMIT Synod is struggling to respond effectively but also quickly. GMIT clergy, lay leaders, and youth seek to support congregations and presbyteries in responding not only to those who are ill with virus-like symptoms or most vulnerable to the virus, but also to a very large group of individuals affected by the economic impact, particularly daily wage workers and farmers whose crops failed last season due to lack of rainfall. Social media offers a plethora of educational materials, many produced by the

> government and NGOs, while at the same time it broadcasts false news and hoaxes. There has been significant resistance by many church members regarding the Synod's call to shift to house worship for several months. The message is made more difficult by the fact that this will affect the annual, and very popular, Easter parade organized

by church youth as well as communion and Easter services. (I should note that similar challenges are faced by the huge Muslim community throughout Indonesia as worship in mosques is also temporarily suspended in the run-up to the fasting month of Ramadan.) We join our partners in the Synod seeking to respond wisely and in faith.

I am on the US Embassy email list and, in recent days, have received almost daily alerts with the same message: if US citizens choose NOT to leave Indonesia, they should be prepared to be here for a long time (of course no one knows for how long). The dominant message of these alerts is to highlight the dwindling number of commercial flights available from Indonesia that would reach the US. The Indonesia-US flight via Kuala Lumpur (Malaysia) is no longer available, and today's alert explains that flights via Tokyo will no longer be available from 1-21 April. It seems clear the embassy's concern is there may come a time when no flights to the US will be available.

The geographic gulfs that separate us may feel increasingly wide, yet the tie that binds our hearts close remains strong through Christ. Thank you for your reminders of that.
