


Let me begin by saying, "I miss you." I miss worshipping in the sanctuary and hearing everyone singing. I miss how powerful it feels

Hi everyone! This is to inform the congregation that on April 4th, 2020, the Church Council, with recommendation from the Trustees, unanimously voted to recommend that the church apply for the "Paycheck Protection Program"

Loan Guarantee" (PPP loan) under the current CARES Act.

For those that are unfamiliar with this program, the CARES act was set up for small businesses to apply for a low interest loan (1%) through the SBA (Small Business Administration). For the first time, churches were included in the application process for a small business loan.

The Church Council learned on Sunday, May 3rd that the loan had been approved and just under

\$40K was deposited into our account on Wednesday, May 6th.

The Council decided the SBA loan was a good course of action. We expect our income to be less over the coming months. Members have lost their jobs which could result in lower pledge income. Rental fees from outside groups will be reduced or unpaid. The flower sale that provides income has been cancelled.

church apply for the "Paycheck Protection Program as long as the money is solely used for payroll and utilities. Since we have continued to keep our staff employed and utilities need to be paid, we expect these expenses to be forgiven. The amount of the loan to be applied for was computed by our bookkeeper Ed Bumanis. If for some reason the church does not use the whole amount of the loan, the first time, used portion so there is no outstanding loan balance.

May you all stay healthy. Lots of prayers that we can be together soon.

Dear Nativity Friends,

I just finished my daily dose of Coronavirus updates from Governor Andrew Cuomo. The new normal continues. There does seem to be better news on the horizon, but it certainly seems to be a long time coming.

The Saturday recordings for the Sunday services continue. Pastor Ruth, Mike Reed, Sean Irawan, Carissa Gigliotti and I have established an order of recording so that only the people recording need to be in the Sanctuary. We all come and go as Mike Reed video shoots all the separate parts including the Liturgist segment. When all the parts have been recorded, Mike then blends the segments together to create the seamless service we all see on Sunday mornings (or whenever you choose to view the service).

With the continuing hope of maintaining safe and social distancing, we still are only using a small number of participating musicians each week. The singers who have shared their talents with us since Easter are: Mother and son duo Sue and Steven Copps, Laura Garrett, Jeannine Campbell, another mother and son duo Debbie and Aaron McDuffie, and Sharon Schlegel.

We had a couple of musical highlights this month. Sue Copps pulled out her French Horn to play the obbligato part to the beautiful "I Have Not Seen but I Believe" by Sally DeFord. Of course, that Steve Copps kid was the soloist. We also had the opportunity to premiere the new song "Shelter Me" by Michael Joncas who is also the composer of the very popular anthem "On Eagle's Wings." On March 27 of this year he wrote "A Prayer-Song in the Time of the COVID-19 Pandemic. These are difficult times for all of us, individually and globally. The COVID-19 pandemic has disrupted life as normal and called for acts of corporate and individual heroism in the face of present suffering and an uncertain future. People of faith may be struggling to articulate their

belief in an all-good and all-powerful God in this new era. "Shelter Me" is my attempt as a church composer to find God's presence even in these fraught times. Based on the beloved Psalm 23, my paraphrase adapts the psalmist's sentiments to respond to our present anxieties." Former Praise Team singer Jeannine Campbell was able to come back and join Steve Copps for this haunting duet. We plan to present this recording to Linda Tomsen in the hopes that she will create another one of her uplifting videos.

The Chancel Choir continues to Zoom meet every

other Thursday evening. These meetings allow us the chance to check in with each other. So much is changing every day. We have shared updated church news and events, personal situations and needs and a fair share of good news and laughter. We had



nineteen folks join in the last time we Zoomed. It's proving to be a decent way to have socially distanced fellowship. The Youth Choir has also had several Zoom meetings. This too has been a great way to check-in with the kids about doing schoolwork at home, coping with siblings, and of course, boredom. Most of the kids are actually doing quite well considering. Their main concern is the new homework load. We have been having virtual rehearsals together at each Zoom. Since the kids already have copies of the cantata at home, it made sense to give it a try. So off we went practicing "The Big Fish - Jonah's Whale of a Tale." The plan is to keep working on the piece in the hopes that we may get to perform it for the congregation in the future.

It is hard to believe that summer is fast approaching while life is still in the pause mode. I expect that we will be posting a summer soloist sign up sheet as soon as we can. Stay tuned! Until then,

the Zoom program. The youth were able to see and virtually meet each other. We look forward to arranging an in-person meeting in the future.



Giving by Mail

We are so grateful to all those who have been faithfully sending in their offerings by postal mail. Here are a few tips to make the process easier for you & work more smoothly on Nativity's end for the counters & for Ed Bumanis, our volunteer bookkeeper.

If you are making a donation to the Deacons' Fund, which helps those in need, please write a separate check. These donations are deposited into a separate bank account.

• If you normally pay your pledge using the boxed envelope sets, it is not necessary to send in all



the envelopes for each week that your check covers. Just put the check in one envelope as your offering will be counted in full for the week in which the check is received.

You can use one check to donate to the General Fund & the Building Fund. The Building Fund is not a separate account, it is contained within the General Fund account. Just note on the Memo line how much of the check is to be credited to each fund.

You may access our pre-recorded virtual worship service through the YouTube link we send by email or via our Facebook page, Church of the Nativity United Church of Christ. We "premier" our recorded service

on Facebook on Sunday mornings at 10:30 am. You can check-in, say "hi", or share a comment. Carissa is online to moderate the feed and reply to any comments. (Please remember that like everything else on FB pages, comments you make will be public and can be seen by anyone.) Once the video is over, it remains on the page for those who wish to share the post or watch it later.

Did you know that people from South Carolina, Ohio, California, and Minnesota are connecting with us on-line? How exciting is that? If you like a particular worship service, we hope you'll consider sharing our worship link or Facebook page with friends or family.

How About Connecting for Coffee?

Join us for Nativity's Virtual Coffee Hour via Zoom, Sundays at 11:00 AM! What is a Virtual Coffee Hour? This is our opportunity to connect with each



other like we did when we were worshipping in the building, except you provide your own snacks and coffee. During this time, we'll do a quick connect and then Carissa, or another member of Nativity staff, will facilitate a "Question for Reflection" discussion based on the service for that day. If we have more than fifteen people, we can even divide into smaller groups. This is another way we can stay connected and "be the church, without being in the church."

You can join the Virtual Coffee Hour three ways:

- 1. With a computer/laptop;
- 2. With a tablet/smartphone;
- 3. With a home phone. To join with video on your laptop, all you need is a camera, which most already have, and to click on the



Zoom link that is sent via email. To join with video using a smartphone or tablet, you must first download the Zoom app from your App Store/ Google Play Store (it's free) and then click on the link. Once you click on the link, you will be asked for the meeting password which will be the same every week. If you prefer not to use video or don't have any tech gadgets, that's ok! You can also call into the coffee hour using a cell phone or a land line. Those who are calling in will have to enter the Meeting ID (sent via email) on your phone along with the password. Please do not share the link, ID, or password with anyone not from Nativity. This will allow us to keep the meeting secure.

If you have any technical issues, you can contact Carissa and she will try to help. We hope some of you will join us for Virtual Coffee Hour one Sunday!



The Clean Air Coalition During the Time of Pandemic

As previously conveyed in May's *Nativity News*, the Clean Air Coalition (CAC) hasn't missed a step. Rather, we've actually stepped it up. Utilizing Zoom meetings three to four times a week, usually for 90 minutes, we are vigorously planning and working on our various causes. And, of course, there's homework.

If you didn't have a chance to "attend" our virtual *Open House* held Thursday, May 28, you still may be able to see it online. The plan is to have it posted on our website (cacwny.org). This was an opportunity for people to learn about the workings and the projects of this vibrant social justice environmental group. Our history, campaigns, details on our new Handbook, some entertainment and activities also allowed people to learn how to become members.

One of our causes is our attempt to counter attempts to weaken the EPA. As part of our campaign, I wrote an article for *Another Voice* for the Buffalo News entitled "Citizens, states must fight against the weakening of EPA." We hope to prompt NY's Attorney General to take action against the Trump Administration. Besides detailing the various aspects of the issue, we are working with many other groups in taking action.


We are pushing to effect substantial change at the Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC). The DEC has two major operations to clean up environmental disasters. One is called the Brownfield Cleanup Program (BCP) and the other is the State Superfund (SSF). They both offer very little public input/involvement in their respective programs. We aim to change that. Modeled after the setup for the EPA's Superfund, we endeavor to create Citizen Advisory Groups (CAG) for the BCP and SSF programs. This is in line with our goal of having business and governmental entities be transparent and accountable.

In another project, we are investigating using the land bank idea to deal with the aftermath of the Battaglia Demolition case. Also, Tesla is emerging as a civil rights hotbed involving some pretty bad business practices that violate the rights of some of their workers.

If you are inspired by the social and environmental justice agenda of the CAC, we always welcome the creativity of concerned and dedicated citizens of Western New York. Become a member now.

planning to have some type of Walk. It might be possible to gather and walk in accordance with governmental and medical directives. It just wouldn't be the usual bunches of walkers but instead a (hopefully) very long line. We might have people walk on their own on a designated day or days (Saturday or Sunday). We might ask them to keep a video-log of their walk and post it online somehow. Pledges would probably have to be online, which

So stay tuned for information when we give out the details of our decisions and ways for people to participate and donate. It should be extremely obvious that the Ken-Ton CROP Hunger Walk is more important than ever.

Healing a Community by Phyllis Byrd

"We live in hope, in spite of civil wars and feeling like outcasts because of the Ebola pandemic that devastated our country in 2014." These are the words of one official at the Mission of Hope School in Liberia. The school is owned and run by the International Christian Fellowship Ministries, one of

the Organization of Africa Instituted Churches (OAIC) member churches in Liberia.

"We don't have time for lamentations," said the

Global Missions Director, "because Liberia lags so far behind in education. We had to close the school because of how fast the Ebola virus was spreading. Students stopped coming to school for a year or more."

The Mission of Hope school was once a leading school in educating children all over Liberia. The school had a reputation for producing students that excelled so well they went on to study in various universities in Liberia as well as other coun-

tries. The school sits on 500 acres of land and they have become a lifeline for the community. The community benefits from the school's models for farming, fishponds, and fruit trees such as avocados, grapefruits, almonds, and cashews.

It's been 3 years since Liberia was declared Ebola-

free and Mission of Hope is in the process of reestablishing themselves as an institution of excellence. but great faith and a vision

to rebuild the dignity of the community that has been eroded due to wars, Ebola, poverty, etc. Global Ministries accompanies Mission of Hope through OAIC as they join with the community to transform the entire area into a village of hope.
